






TRADE IN AGRO-FOOD PRODUCTS IS INCREASINGLY 'GLOBAL'





Trade in agro-food products is increasingly 'global'


- Sectors producing food source their intermediate inputs internationally
 - ➤ Production processes buy from Global Value Chains (GVCs)
- Agro-food products also get used in the production of other food products
 - Exports are sold into Global Value Chains (import to produce exports)
- E-commerce is part of this landscape
- Interconnections mean policies have wider impacts on markets

Centrality as buyers of value added from the agriculture and food sectors for final demand, 2014








Centrality in agro-food global value chains

The enabling environment for agriculture can have strong links to e-commerce in agro-food products and poverty reduction

Public services to the sector that include:

- Infrastructure and connectivity
- Research & development and extension services
- Marketing and promotion
- Inspection (product safety, pest and disease inspection and control, input control)

Broader enabling environment for agriculture:


- > Financial services

Support through prices (Market Price Support):

arising from market intervention with policies that create a differential between domestic and border prices

→ concept of "opportunity price (cost)"

General services to the sector: GSSE

Marketing and promotion


Inspection and control

Public stockholding







The composition of overall support matters





A large share of support targets individual commodities


Percentage of gross receipts for each commodity, 2000-02 and 2015-17

Percentage of gross farm receipts for each commodity, 2015-17




% of commodity gross farm receipt for each commodity




Support to general services continues to vary across countries

>>> Concluding remarks

To strengthen the sector's capacity to respond to future challenges and opportunities — including those generated by e-commerce — a variety of general services will be crucial

- → various forms of sector-specific hard and soft infrastructure, through appropriate investments from ICT to transportation facilities, which have an important role in improving farmers' connectedness to markets, knowledge and other services
- → appropriate investments in animal and plant health systems, required to enhance the preparedness of their agricultural sectors to respond to future challenges and opportunities
- → a well-functioning agricultural innovation system, adapted to the needs of the sector

Within the envelope of transfers to individual producers, there are also opportunities to improve the targeting of support, to better align the measures used with countries' goals for the sector
